Our Queen's 60 years Celebrations and the Olympic Games have held our attention, whilst one of the wettest summers since records began left many homeless with floods all over the country. The only occasion on which a kitchen was cancelled due to the weather was in late September when most of the roads were gridlocked with traffic due to excess water.

In July NEHL received a blow to the operation with the resignation of Brian MacAnaney, their long serving Street Work Manager. The Trustees wish to thank Brian for his hard work over the past 15 years. His experience will be greatly missed by everyone. We wish him well in his future employment. Another blow was the news that we could no longer use the preparation kitchen at Hope



House. We would like to express our gratitude to the owners who have allowed us to use the facilities free of charge for many years. The last problem, which has emerged over past months, is that some of lack our clients the knowledge and confidence in applying for the benefits which are

available and so miss out on help and support at a time when they need it most. It is good to report that each of these setbacks will be resolved shortly.

A reorganisation of the workload and the usual job advertising and interviewing led to John Robinson taking on the role of Street Kitchen Team Leader on Teesside and the appointment of Paul

Robinson (no relation) as Street Kitchen Team Member on Teesside. John and Paul began these new roles on 22nd October.

Funding has been obtained to employ a Community Support Worker, initially for 6 months, to assist our clients in their applications for the benefits and help to which they are entitled. Paul Haigh, who has a tremendous amount of experience in this field, joined us on $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ September.

Whilst this was happening we were trying hard to find a suitable preparation kitchen. The three Teesside Councils were approached about suitable premises. Middlesbrough Council responded extremely quickly and gave a list of potential units. A visit was arranged and a unit in Middlesbrough was identified as very suitable, following some adaptation. Our interest in the property was registered immediately and we are in process of agreeing a lease with the Council. We hope to have the details finalised soon. During this time Grange Road Baptist Church, Darlington generously agreed to allow us to use their kitchen for the

generously agreed to allow us to use their kitchen for the preparation of the food for our street kitchens and this has been carried out by John, with support from Paul Haigh and from Trustees. This has meant that the provision of hot meals and drinks has continued at the Teesside kitchens throughout the period when no NEHL preparation kitchen was available.

The kitchen at Newcastle on Sunday evenings continues to have large numbers attending and, they too, welcome the hot meals and drinks and the support which is offered.
